Fast reading is the ultimate learning skill in 2020. Read on to learn all about this amazing technique! What is speed reading? On average, an adult can read somewhere between 200 and 300 words per minute. With quick reading skills, you can read much faster—about 1,500 words per minute. Yes, that sounds impossible, but it's true. To understand how this skill works, you must first know how the reading process works within the human brain. The process of reading The first step is for the eyes to look at the word. This fixation on each word takes about 0.25 seconds. Then you start moving your eyes to the next word. It takes 0.1 seconds for the brain to move from one word to another. It's called saccade. You usually take 4-5 words in your head, or a sentence, at once. After all the fixations and saccades, the brain again goes through the whole phrase to process the meaning. It takes about half a second. Overall, this means that average people read 200 to 300 words per minute. Speeding up the process The concept of quick reading is to speed up by at least 5 times. As the saccade period cannot be further shortened, the speed reading highlights faster fixations. To do this, scientists recommend the reader skip sub-vocalization: when readers actually say a word in their mind, even when reading silently. Basically, quick reading is a technique of seeing words only instead of saying them quietly. Don't confuse it with skimming. When a reader skips a text, it skips over parts that their brain deems unnecessary. You can skip important information in the process, and skimming does not allow the brain to retain what has been read. Why speed read? Speed reading is not only fast, it's also effective. This skill saves a lot of time without sacrificing information. It has also been proven to improve memory. Brain performance improves while reading speed, allowing the reader to remember more information than before. Because the speed reading stabilizes the brain, the information is processed faster and more efficiently. Believe it or not, this technique leads to improved focus, too. As the brain receives a lot of information while reading speed, there is far less chance of distraction. The brain focuses solely on the work at hand. Since the brain is, after all, a muscle, the process of reading speed acts as an exercise. Just like the rest of your muscles, your brain needs exercise to grow stronger, too. A focused brain means improved logical thinking. As your brain gets used to receiving and organizing so much information so quickly, your thinking process will faster. There are different techniques that can be used to master this skill. Opt for the one that best suits your learning style. 1. Pointer method The person responsible for popularizing speed reading, Evelyn Wood, has come up with the cursor method. It's a simple technique where the reader uses his index finger to slide over the text he's reading. As the finger moves, the brain moves coherently along with it. It is an effective technique for focusing the eyes where the finger goes without causing any distraction. Readers tend to back-skip. The cursor method prevents this from happening, saving at least half the reading time. 2. Scanning Method In this technique, the reader's eyes move only along one part of the page. This can be the left or right side of the text, but it is usually the center because it is most convenient. Instead of walking through the entire text from left to right, the vision moves from top to bottom. This method involves fixating on keywords, such as names, numbers, or other specific terms. In this way, the turn time is kept to a minimum. 3. Perceptual expansion In general, the reader focuses on one word at a time. This technique, on the other hand, encourages the brain to read a piece of the word together. In doing so, this method increases the peripheral vision of readers. Here's the thing: although the fixation time remains the same with perceptual expansion, the number of words to which the eyes fix increases. Basically, the brain receives 5 times more information in the same time period. This technique is the hardest to master and it takes the most time to learn. You will need the help of a quick reading tool to practice the perceptual expansion method. However, once you have mastered it, this technique will offer you the fastest reading pace with maximum knowledge input. It has been proven that regularly practicing speed reading is the fastest way to learn this skill. Here are some great options to look at: 1. This app trains readers to read faster by displaying words one by one on the screen. Instead of ingling through lines or long texts, Reedy prepares the user to focus on one word at a time. While this is not an effective method for learning to read long texts quickly, it's a great way to start. 2. ReadMe! Whether you're an Android or iOS user, you can take advantage of ReadMe! Application. This app even comes with some e-book options to practice speed reading. Start by selecting the font size, color, layout, and so on. In addition, there are different reading methods that the user can choose from. If you want to practice reading sentence by sentence or in short paragraphs, you can choose a focused reading mode. Beeline reader mode changes the color of text to guide the reading eye from start to finish at a certain pace. Finally, there is a spritz mode in which the app focuses on parts of the word at once. This controls the peripheral vision of readers. However, this mode is not fully available in the free version of the app. The Spreeder Spreeder is available on iOS and Android. However, users can also get benefits from Spreeder websites. This app allows the reader to paste in any text they would like to read quickly. Starting at a fairly low speed, the app flashes words one by one. Gradually, as the user becomes more comfortable, the speed increases. Slowly, the user is trained to read quickly without skipping any words. This app differs from others because it tracks user reading improvements, recording overall reading time and speed. Controversy over speed reading True, speed reading sounds too good to be true. It is hard to believe that it is humanly possible to achieve such a fast pace without compromising the quality of the information you receive. Perhaps as a result, there are people who do not trust the process of reading speed. They believe that when you read text at such a high speed, speed readers cannot develop a good understanding. The truth is that speed reading won't be of use if you don't understand the text you're reading, no matter how fast you do it. Similarly, if you read slowly and still wouldn't keep or understand the information you're reading, that would be useless, too. However, there are several factors to consider here. When reading at a normal pace, there is plenty of time between each step of the process to get the brain distracted. Conversely, a quick reading does not leave time brain brain to something else.
